Course Description

The course intends to provide students with economic and analytical tools to understand how consumers make choices; how firms make decisions, subject to technological constraints, market structure, and strategic interactions with other firms.

In contrast to many Introductory Economics classes, Intermediate Microeconomic Theory shifts the focus from learning facts about economics to learning techniques for examining economic questions.

- 1. Use calculus and other techniques to solve microeconomic optimization problems.
- 2. Understand how to apply microeconomic models to consumer and producer decision-making.
- 3. Solve microeconomic optimization problems under different market structures.

There will be four problem sets: one in the first week, reviewing basic math tools; other three are about economics. Problem sets have to be handed in on time, there is no possibility to make up for late problem sets.

Each problem set can be done in groups of up to four, but each student needs to submit their own solutions. Your solutions need to be scanned and compiled into a single easy-to-read PDF document (many apps let you do this on your phone), either uploaded into Canvas or e-mailed to me.

If you submit multiple images, only the first one displayed will be graded. If some parts of your solutions are not readable, you don't get credit for that parts. If you fail to submit a problem set, you get a zero.
